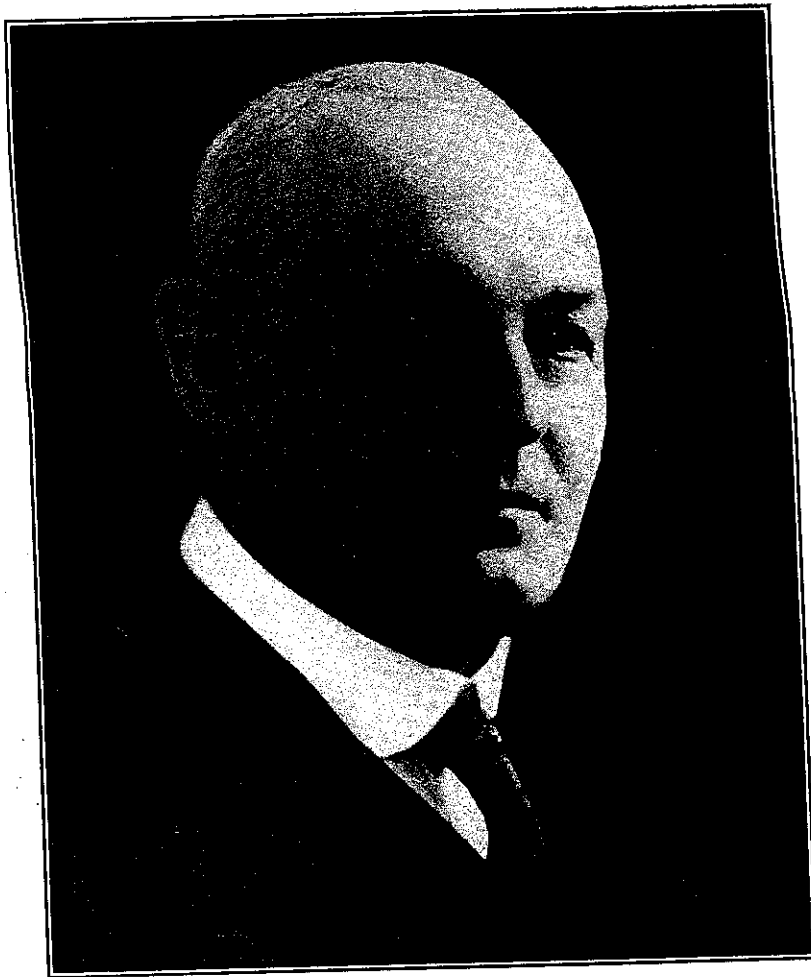

The Most Worshipful Grand Master then addressed Grand Lodge as follows:

GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS.

Brethren of Grand Lodge:

In welcoming you to our Sixty-sixth Annual Communication I am glad to be able to say that during the year no contention of any kind has arisen and harmony has prevailed throughout the jurisdiction. There is, however, one cause for deep regret in the absence from our gathering of some notable figures in Masonic life.

NECROLOGY.

At our last communication there was present Past Grand Master Vroom, who, despite his years, entered into the activities of the Craft with that eager kindliness for which he was always noted. On 3rd October last he passed from among us, but his memory will remain as an active Mason whose knowledge of the history of the craft was unexcelled. Always a student, he brought to bear upon his work the resources of a cultivated mind and had done much for the jurisdiction of which he was the head in the years 1926 and 1927. The same month witnessed the relinquishment by Past Grand Master

Forbes of his hold upon that life which he always enjoyed and which he endeavored to make pleasant for others in their progress in Free Masonry. When Grand Master in 1899 and 1900 he carried on, more fully than any predecessor, the system of Grand Master's visits to the several lodges in the jurisdiction, which has now come to be accepted as a useful stimulant to Masonic endeavor.

Withdrawn from active participation in the Craft by reason of years of illness which confined him to his house, Past Grand Master Henry S. Bridges entered into rest on the 11th December. His work as an educationist in the Saint John community has already borne fruit and will continue to bear it in years to come by the impression which he made upon the thousands of young men and women who came under his guidance. His craft work is well known and his death took from us one who loved the fraternity well.

The inroads of Death into the ranks of Past Grand Masters was not yet complete. The 12th March saw the end after long illness of Past Grand Master Hedley V. B. Bridges, another leader of matchless skill in the craft and who labored, particularly in his own portion of the jurisdiction for perfection of ritual—and attained it. For many years head of the Normal School of this Province, he, too, has left his abiding mark upon the succeeding generation.

These brethren have also been led by the invisible Hand into that bourne from which no traveller returns. We mourn their loss.

I dedicated the beautiful and commodious hall of Northumberland Lodge at Newcastle in accordance with Masonic usage. On that occasion the brethren present heard from P. M. Dr. Robert Nicholson an interesting account of the institution and history of this lodge. I was so much impressed with the value of this paper that I requested P. M. Nicholson to send a copy to the Grand

Secretary to be preserved in our archives, and I am much obliged to the brother for having done so. I would like to suggest that this excellent example should be imitated throughout the jurisdiction. A body of Masonic history may thus easily be accumulated and such collections will be of value as well to the general historian of future time.

VISITATIONS.

I had the pleasure on September 28th and 29th of being present with the brethren of Lodge Saint John of Bathurst where a Lodge of Instruction was opened and attended by members from Campbellton, Restigouche, Northumberland and Miramichi Lodges. With the valuable assistance of R.W. Bro. Hartt, Grand Secretary, the ritual of the three degrees was most carefully studied and I am sure that this gathering has been productive of excellent results throughout this portion of the jurisdiction. I suggest that it would be well for groups of lodges to associate in this manner in other localities for a similar purpose. By this means as well as by following the example of my immediate predecessor in continuing District Deputy Grand Masters in office so that they may feel it worth while to study the work intensely and be of practical benefit as instructors, a considerable degree of uniformity in ritual can easily be obtained. It had been suggested that the District Deputy Grand Masters should be brought together at Saint John for instruction at an earlier period of the Masonic year than heretofore and accordingly they met on the 26th and 27th October. There was a good attendance and I am sure the result has been excellent.

On 7th October I had the pleasure of attending at Halifax a banquet to M.W. Bro. Harris, Grand Master of Nova Scotia, whose services to the craft both within and without his jurisdiction are so well and favorably known. The gathering was enthusiastic in its character and meeting with the brethren of our sister Grand Lodge was most inspiring.

On 3rd November, accompanied by a large number of members of Grand Lodge, I paid an official visit to my mother Lodge, Carleton Union, No. 8, where the 3rd Degree was worked. On the 14th of the same month, with a large staff, I had the pleasure of visiting St. Martins Lodge, where the 3rd Degree was also worked, and on the 29th of November, with other representatives of Grand Lodge, I witnessed an exemplification of the same degree by Ashlar Lodge at McAdam. The 2nd December witnessed the election of officers by Albion Lodge and a supper in connection therewith, at which I was very glad to be present. During December and January I installed the officers of Carleton Union, St. John's, Hibernia, New Brunswick, Corinthian, and the Union Lodge of Portland.

Victoria Lodge at Milltown was visited on 13th July, Miramichi Lodge at Chatham on 17th July, Sussex Lodge at St. Stephen on August 1st, St. George Lodge on 2nd August, and Sunbury Lodge at Fredericton Junction on 5th August. Four of these lodges exemplified a degree or some portion of a degree, and Sunbury Lodge worked the Third Degree in excellent form. In all cases the work was smoothly and satisfactorily performed. There are, and of course, naturally will be, slight differences in ritual, but all the lodges observe the ancient landmarks so well and their spirit is so enthusiastic that I think it is only necessary to develop still further the system of education by District Deputy Grand Masters and Lodges of instruction to attain practical harmony in matters of detail.

IMPORTANT EVENTS.

The outstanding event of the year was the dedication of the Masonic Peace Memorial in London. The Grand Lodge of England sent us an invitation to send two representatives and I had hoped to be personally present at this impressive spectacle. Unfortunately at a date too late I found that other duties interfered with my attendance and that it was not, at that time, possible to make arrangements for our Grand Lodge to be represented. Another event of interest to the brethren on this side of

the Atlantic was the celebration by St. John's Lodge, Boston, of its 200th anniversary. This lodge was instituted at the Bunch of Grapes Tavern, King Street (now State Street), on 30th July, 1733, and was the first duly constituted lodge in America.

FINANCES.

I am sure the brethren will note with pleasure the encouraging report of the Grand Treasurer, which, in a difficult year, shows the finances of Grand Lodge to be in good condition. The Fund of Benevolence, which has responded to every call made upon it, has not been appreciably affected by the economic conditions of the time.

SUPPORT AND RITUAL.

I desire to express my hearty thanks for the valuable assistance which I have received, especially from the Grand Secretary and the Grand Director of Ceremonies, as well as from many Past Grand Masters and brethren who have cheerfully given of their time to further the advancement of our Order. After consultation with the Board of General Purposes it was decided that it would be unwise to exemplify a degree at this convocation. I trust that this omission will not again occur as I think the brethren outside of Saint John consider this as the most interesting feature of the gathering. I hope that the Ritual Committee will begin as early as they consider needful to make arrangements for the working of a degree next year and I suggest that the exemplification should be given by the members of that body together with such other brethren as they may call on to assist them. As the repository of the ritual of the craft the Committee should be in a position to give a perfect illustration of the work.

GENERAL OBSERVATIONS.

Though there exist some evidences that the depression which has affected the whole civilized world is passing away yet the conditions of life remain exceedingly diffi-

cult and under such circumstances rapid growth, or even growth at all of our own or any fraternal order, is not to be expected. It is therefore still important that subordinate lodges should exercise all possible patience and charity in dealing with brethren who, by reason of the universal misfortune, are not able to meet their financial obligations to the Order. Neither is this a time for the increasing of our individual or collective liabilities. Perhaps it may be said that the Great War and the period of speculation which followed it, destroyed the old, homely, but essential virtue of thrift by the exercise of which, so much that we possessed was built up, slowly, by successive generations. No sovereign remedy for present ills is to be found, apparently, in the realm of legislation or state managed finance. The best minds of the age have not yet discovered any vital solution for the problems which beset us and it may be that the world must slowly work its way back to an appreciation of the power in human life which is exercised beneficently, by the humble yet basic principles upon which this Fraternity is founded. Brotherly Love, Relief and Truth will go far to dissipate the miseries of the present situation and in the spirit of fair reward for honest labor willingly performed which characterized those ancient guilds of which we are the speculative successors may be found a way by which we may return to the peace and prosperity of former times.

Brothers LeBaron Wilson and George D. Ellis. Applications received by this Committee numbered 22, and in each case, the aid asked for, after consideration, was granted. The list follows:

It is recommended that the sum of \$2,000 of the cash balance of the Fund be invested and added to the Fund's capital.

Acting on the expressed approval of Grand Lodge, the Special Committee was authorized to procure a portrait of Past Grand Master Forbes, and Mr. E. Wyly Grier of Toronto was commissioned to paint it. It was received early in December and hung in position. Subsequently the Board unanimously agreed to add a portrait of Past

Grand Master Robert T. Clinch by the same artist, and this one has lately been added to those already hanging in the Lodge Room—seven in all.

As the supply of Masonic Manuals had become quite low, a new edition of 500 copies has been printed and the books can be obtained at the former price of 60 cents each.

At the Board's instance, notice of an amendment to Section 3 of the Constitutions as to "District Deputy Grand Masters" has been given in the Annual Proclamation. If this amendment is adopted it will relieve the Deputy Grand Master from the visiting duties of a D.D.G.M. in the District in which he resides and will result in the selection, each year, of a District Deputy for each of the six Districts. It is thought that this change is desirable in view of the present practice under which the District Deputies meet together for mutual instruction and rehearsal.

Attention is directed to the List of Securities held by the Fund of Benevolence. These have been much reduced in number though not in par value. Under the authority of the Directors, the Special Committee on Investments has disposed of small holdings amounting to \$19,500 and acquired in their place Bonds of the Province of Saskatchewan \$5,000, yielding 5½ per cent., and \$14,500 of the Province of British Columbia, also 5½ per cent. The conversion will mean an increase in the income.

The following is the report of a special Committee of the Board of General Purposes respecting the Order of the Eastern Star:

To the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick:

The undersigned, a committee appointed specially by the Board of General Purposes to report directly to Grand Lodge at its present Communication on the question of the Order of the Eastern Star, beg to submit the following report after careful consideration of the matter:

1. It must be universally recognized that the Order referred to is not and cannot be Masonic.

2. It is equally clear that such Order is not and cannot be affiliated to or connected with Masonry in any respect.

3. It is undesirable that Masons, particularly the Secretaries of Lodges, should give to any one for use in connection with such Order, any information as to the standing of Members of our Lodges.

4. It is strongly to be urged upon Masons that they should devote their energies to the upbuilding of their own Lodges, and it is believed that they can best do so through regular attendance at Communications of their own Lodge and participation in its activities. While it may be claimed that the Order of the Eastern Star is in some places locally of assistance to our Order, yet such assistance can be no greater than could and should be given by our own members to the support of the Craft.

5. Association by Masons with the Order mentioned cannot in any case be productive of results sufficiently beneficial to warrant Grand Lodge in any way approving of it and in some instances it may prove to be absolutely harmful.

6. We are of the opinion that the Order of the Eastern Star should be allowed to pursue its own course in the same manner as any other fraternal order composed entirely of women, but Grand Lodge cannot

countenance even an appearance of a connection between Masonry and the other Order which, as we have above pointed out, cannot possibly exist.

It was then moved in amendment by W. Bros. R. Donald Stewart, seconded by W. Bro. Arthur H. Hiltz,

"That the report be referred back to the Board of General Purposes with the request that further information be obtained as to the Order of the Eastern Star, its organization and activities."

The amendment was carried by a vote of forty-three to thirty-eight.

Moved by R.W. Bro. George D. Ellis, P.G.M., and Resolved,

"That when Grand Lodge takes recess, it take recess until the hour of eight o'clock this evening and that the election of the Elective Grand Officers be the order of the day when Grand Lodge resumes at that hour."

The following amendment to Section 2 of "District Deputy Grand Masters", due notice of which had been given in the Proclamation summoning Grand Lodge was now moved by W. Bro. Charles F. Sanford, Vice-President of the Board of General Purposes, which had authorized the notice, viz.:

To strike out the last clause in said section: "provided, however, that for the district in which the deputy grand master, for the time being, resides no district deputy grand master shall be appointed, but the duties of that office shall be discharged by the deputy grand master without prejudice to his rank or precedence."

The motion was seconded by W. Bro. M. L. McPhail and unanimously carried.

It was ordered, on motion,

"That the usual appropriation of five hundred dollars be made to the M.W. Grand Master wherewith to meet the expenses of visiting and instructing the Private Lodges."

Also resolved, on motion of R.W. Bro. George D. Ellis, P.G.M.,

"That the sum of one hundred dollars be voted the Library Committee to enable it to purchase such masonic books as may seem to it desirable."

The M.W. Grand Master—"Grand Lodge will now take recess."

Thursday Evening.

August 24th, 1933.

Grand Lodge resumed labour at 8 o'clock, the M.W. Grand Master in the East, and proceeded to the election of Grand Officers.

The sections of the Constitutions governing elections were read and the M.W. Grand Master then appointed as scrutineers, Wor. Bros. R. E. McMillan, Harry A. Watson, J. Oliver Spinney and Malcolm L. McPhail, and they were pledged to the faithful discharge of their duty.

After written nomination and ballot and on the report of the scrutineers M.W. Brother, the Honourable John B. M. Baxter was unanimously re-elected Most Worshipful Grand Master and he was declared so elected by the R.W. Deputy Grand Master.

REPORT ON GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS.

To the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick:

The Committee appointed to consider the Address of the M.W. the Grand Master express its appreciation of the careful attention the Grand Master has given the interests of the Fraternity and share his satisfaction with the evidence of continued harmony during such a trying period.

The passing to the Great Beyond of so many Members of Grand Lodge since our last Annual Communication (including no less than four Past Grand Masters), cannot do other than again attract our attention to the most precious teaching of our profession and we heartily endorse the M.W. Grand Master's words that peace, light and joy be to those with whom we have been privileged to labor and who are now but memories of a day that is past.

We recommend, as in the past, the names of those Members of Grand Lodge who have passed away since our last Annual Communication be referred to in the report of proceedings of Grand Lodge for 1933 in the space allotted to IN MEMORIAM, and that the name of P.M. Dr. C. C. Alexander of St. George Lodge, No. 12, be included in the list.

We congratulate Northumberland Lodge, No. 17, on the dedication during the year, of their new Masonic Home, manifesting the courage and foresight of our Brethren of Northumberland Lodge.

It is a matter of great satisfaction that the Grand Master has been able to visit officially so many of the private Lodges. Such visits must inspire all present, and the close contact and opportunities afforded of receiving advice and instruction are greatly to the interest of the Craft.

It is to be regretted that the Grand Master was not privileged to carry out his original intention of being present to officially represent in person the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick at the dedication of the Masonic Peace Memorial in London.

The satisfactory condition of the Financial Accounts of Grand Lodge must be a source of pride to all members of the Fraternity and our appreciation of the efforts of those who had

the handling of same during such unsettled times, as we have been passing through, should not go unrecorded.

The Committee concur in the suggestion of the Grand Master that a Degree be exemplified at the next Annual Communication of Grand Lodge and that the exemplification of same be given by the Ritual Committee.

We consider the general observations of the M.W. Grand Master most timely and with him, trust that the slight evidence of the passing of the period of the depression, may grow and that normal conditions may be gradually restored—we concur in the suggestion that subordinate Lodges exercise all possible patience and charity in dealing with Brethren who by reason of misfortune are not able to meet their financial obligations to the Order. May wise counsel prevail and our best thought be directed to assist those in authority to further, as suggested by the Grand Master, the basic principle upon which our Fraternity is founded.

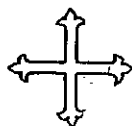
