

DEVOTIONAL ADDRESS — "The Light Of The World"

"And God said "Let there be Light and there was Light." Genesis 1:3

"But as many as received Him, to them he gave the power to become the Sons of God. John 1:12

From the very beginnings of time, the juxtaposition of Light and Darkness have fascinated Man. We can cast our minds back to our very earliest ancestors and visualize them, as the light faded and darkness approached, seeking the shelter of caves and crannies, there to huddle in fear and trembling as they heard the strange noises of the night. Filled with fear, not only of the nocturnal animals who came out to hunt and prowl during the hours of darkness, but fearful also of the denizens of the spirit world who were believed to be abroad during the midnight hours.

As we read the biblical Creation story, the very first effort of the Divine Creator was to divide the hours of the day into Light and darkness. This points out the importance of light and darkness to our ancestors. From early days Light has been equated with good — darkness with evil. God has been referred to as "The Lord of Light" — Satan as "The Prince of Darkness." The ancients held Light to be Holy — Hence the Bible associated God with Light.

The Christian Bible has been referred to as one of the "Great Lights in Free Masonry." and the pages of that Bible are studded with references to Light.

God not only is Light (1st. John 1:5) He lives in it (Ex.24:10) (1 Tim. 6:16) and is clothed in it (Ps 104:2)

When God is incarnated He becomes the "Light of the World" (John 1:1-18;18:12). To walk in light brings salvation (John 18:12;12:36; 1st. John 1:7; 2 Cor. 4:6 etc.) while a life without light is seen as darkness (John 3:19; 12:46 etc.)

We find the disciples called the children of light (Ep. 5:8)

In Matt. 5:16 we are admonished to "let your light so shine among men that they may see your good works and glorify your father which is in Heaven."

In 2 Cor. 4:6 we read "for God who commanded the light to shine out of darkness hath shined in our hearts, to give the light of knowledge of the Glory of God.

"To give light of the knowledge of glory of God.

The first question asked of a candidate to partake in the mysteries of Free Masonry is about his beliefs in God. Without such a belief he cannot enter our portals for all Masons acknowledge the overlordship of the Great Architect and Ruler of the Universe.

The next thought in the mind of a candidate is "What does it mean to be a Mason. One of the most beautiful answers to this question is found in the following poem — "Last Night I knelt where Hiram Knelt."

SOMETHING TO REMEMBER . . .**LAST NIGHT I KNELT,
WHERE HIRAM KNELT**

Last night I knelt where Hiram knelt
And took an obligation,
And now I'm closer to my God,
For I'm a Master Mason.

Tho heretofore my fellowmen seemed
Each one like the other,
Today I search each one apart,
I'm looking for "My Brother".
And as I feel his friendly grip
It fills my heart with pride
I know that while I'm on the square
That he is on my side.
His footsteps on my errand go
If I should such require
His prayers will plead in my behalf
If I should such desire
My words are safe within his breast
As though within my own
His hand forever on my back
To help me safely home.
Good counsel whispers in my ear
And warns of any danger,
By Square and Compass, 'Tis Brother now!
Who once would call me stranger.
I might have lived a moral life
And risen to distinction
Without my Brother's helping hand
And the fellowship of Masons;
But God who knows how hard it is
To resist life's temptations

Another question frequently posed is "How should I know you to be a Mason?" The replies contain references to adherence to the Tenets of Brotherly Love, Relief and Truth; to the practice of Temperance, Fortitude, Prudence and Justice toward all men; to the cultivation of the use of the Attentive Ear — the Instructive Tongue and the Faithful Breast. A mason is advised and admonished to practice these and many other splendid virtues. But the question "How should I know you to be a Mason" is not confined to Brothers within the Craft. Certainly we ask the question and we are provided with many confidential means to satisfy ourselves concerning a stranger's claims. But there are those outside the Craft who ask the same question and can only find their answers in what they can observe of the man while outside the Lodge.

One problem confronting the Craft in recent years has been a drop in membership. Those who are attempting to reverse the trend are faced with the fact that we are not allowed to solicit membership. Those who wish to join our ranks must approach us of their own free will and accord. How can we make them eager and desirous to do so?

I would like to suggest that the answer lies in the words of Scripture quoted and the useful application of the teachings of Free Masonry. We are the custodians of the Light of which Scripture speaks. In the words of the Bible "once we dwelt in darkness but now we dwell in God's marvellous Light." If we are to attract men to Masonry, we must do what the Great Light in Free Masonry instructs to us — "Let your light so shine among men." We must begin to live out the truths of Scripture and Masonry so that men can look at us, find within our lives things that they would have for themselves and so be lead to join our ranks so that they, too, may find the secret of victorious living.

We come into the Lodge in Darkness — we ask for Light — More Light — further Light. Then we are admonished to continually to strive to improve ourselves in Masonry, using the Light which has been given us.

But should we confine this improvement to the confines of this Lodge or this building? We pledge our allegiance to that Supreme Intellect which pervades all nature; therefore if we are to be true to our vows, under that All-seeing Eye above, the light which we shed should shine over all our world.

Last year Rev. David Jackson spoke on the subject "What shape is your Temple In" pointing out that we are all the Temple of God. I would like to ask the question this year — "what Light Shines forth from the windows of your Temple?"

On the street where I live there are three places — one is a vacant lot — one is an abandoned house — one is a simple two storey dwelling. From the vacant lot light has never gone forth — from the abandoned house light did shine at one time. STATE OF THE ORDER

There is an expression in use in some forms of advertising today which says "If you are not part of the solution, you are part of the problem".

If we have any problems with Freemasonry today, we who are gathered in this room today, also have the solutions. The main problem as I see it, is the meager attendance at Lodge meetings and the apathy which would seem to permeate the Fraternity as it pertains to Blue Lodge activities.

Visits to various Lodges and seeing the attendance in some of them has been very dis-heartening. I must say that Masonry seems to be in excellent shape in many others. Where attendance seems to be down is in those Lodges where interesting programs have not been planned.

Let us examine some of the questions which come to mind. Have we spent too much time in the past years making members, and not enough time making masons? Are our Lodge Programs interesting enough to hold the attention of our members? Are our members using Craft Masonry only as a stepping stone to something which they believe to be of greater value? Are we making it too easy for a man to become a Mason? Do we sell membership in the Craft and our Principles too cheaply? As Past Grand Master Dwight Smith put it in one of his Publications, are we guarding the West Gate?

These questions can go on and on.

So what are the solutions? I believe that we who are gathered in this room today have the solutions, but we, and only we, as current and past officers of our Lodges can make those solutions work.

Try some of these on for size.

Do you have a program committee in your lodge to plan interesting activities that will attract your membership. Activities which are other than the traditional ceremonies of the degrees.

Does your lodge have a project within the community. Do you put Masonry to work outside the Lodge room or is it dropped like an old cloak at the door.

Does your Lodge make it possible for the brother Master Masons on the side to participate in the degrees and in the lectures.

Do you have any regular plan of visitations to other Lodges within and without our Jurisdiction.

This list can go on and on. You will find, as an addendum to this address, two excellent papers which were presented this year at the Philadelphia Conference of the Grand Masters of North America. As I before stated, it was my privilege to attend this conference and to participate in the discussions of these and other papers. One of these is by M.W. Brother Martens, Grand Master of Wyoming, and the other by M.W. Brother Frank Coumont,

Grand Master of Oregon. I will ask you to take these papers back to your Lodges, study them, discuss them, and let the members of your Lodge do some serious thinking about our future.

Each year, as the annual returns come in, we see more and more names of members who have ceased to be members through the medium of suspensions for Non Payment of Dues, Demits and Withdrawals. This should be a matter of concern to all of us. If freemasonry had the appeal to attract these brethren in the first place, that attraction should not have diminished as it has, because Freemasonry is the same today as it was yesterday, and its principles and moral teachings, the lessons of brotherly love and affection, The Cardinal Virtues, and the blessed Tenets are as they were when the emphasis shifted from Operative to Speculative centuries ago. Fortunately not all of the Lodges within the Jurisdiction are faced with this problem. It has been my fortune to sit in some lodges which have been very well attended by the general membership, but by the same token I have visited Lodges which had to scramble to find officers to fill the stations and open Lodge.

In some cases we have heard it said that one Lodge should consider amalgamation with another in order to increase attendance at both. This is ignoring the basic problem and just because we choose to close our eyes that problem will not go away. It will be there again when we remove the hoodwink.

Brethren, let us resolve to leave this communication determined to put just a little of what you have gotten out of Masonry back into the workings of the craft. It will work wonders for you and your Lodge.

Freemasonry . . . Brotherhood . . . Charity . . . Friendship . . . whatever you may choose to call it, is just the habit of giving our life to others; when we give our life away, we possess more of it. The more we give, the more we receive. To serve and do good to as many as possible; there is nothing greater in your fortune that you should be able, and nothing finer in your nature, than that you should be desirous to do this.

What of the hour in Freemasonry? Brighter, stronger, clearer. We often become discouraged and are inclined to be pessimistic, but amid all the errors and stumbling, a better day is dawning, when we shall see the beneficent labors of Freemasonry shining in effulgent splendor. Freemasonry is growing in power, and as its immortal principles take root in the fallow soil of the human heart and mind, it buds and blossoms into the foliage of kindness and the fruit of charity to all mankind.

And in conclusion;

Be true to the best that is in you
Hold on to the good and the real
Be true to the hope that you cherish
And follow your highest ideal.

Be true to your own intuition
And trust it to lead you aright
When darkness descends round your pathway
Keep straight and look up to the light.

Be true to your high aspirations
Be true to the vows that you made
Be true to yourself and your conscience
And face any man unafraid.

And when the last conflict is ended
The last battle over and won
A voice out of heaven will greet you
With . . . well done, good servant, well done.

RELATIONS WITH CONCORDANT OR APPENDANT BODIES EFFECTIVE MEANS OF COMMUNICATION

Effective means of communications . . . Well, have you ever witnessed a "shoot-out" at high noon between Siamese twins? Regardless of the outcome, both wind up as casualties. This is what I choose to explore for the next 15 minutes, my ideas to unload the pistols of both the Blue Lodges and the Appendant or Concordant Bodies. After all, brethren, we must remember that collectively we have the same ultimate goal. "TO MAKE GOOD MEN BETTER". The quarrel we have with each other is how we persuade a member of one or more orders to divide his time. How we get him to assign his priorities. It really is as simple as that.

I happen to be an active businessman engaged in a highly competitive market to sell my products, and I would like to relate the so-called problems between the Appendant Bodies and the Blue Lodge to a business situation wherein we are in reality trying to barter with a customer (member) to retain his account (time) from our competitors (appendant bodies). One of the main problems we have is an overblown sense of authority with which we regard the other Masonic affiliated organizations. Yes, we are the final au-

thority and we do have the power to perhaps order certain things, but we are dealing with mature men, who for a good percentage, are successful in their fields of endeavor, and they do not lightly take to being ordered about in their private affairs. How much better it is to lead than to order. President Dwight D. Eisenhower said, "If I have to order a man to do a task, he'll only stick as long as I have him scared. If I have convinced him that the task is just and right, he'll stay through hell and high water."

Frankly, what research I have done for this paper has turned up mostly negative approaches toward the Masonic related bodies. "The tail wagging the dog, and the cart before the horse" approach. A part of the title of this paper, "Do these orders strengthen or weaken Masonry?" applies here, and as I am an eternal optimist, I have to answer, (to some of your dismay I am sure,) the appendant and concordant bodies are GOOD for Masonry and generally help to strengthen it. We must face realities that some bodies appear more glamorous, some have sharp, fulltime employees and for all purposes, full time ambassadors and are better organized to promote their programs. They actively solicit and promote to our membership and the public at large, while we operate on an everchanging basis from year to year with new leaders coming along to take the reins of command.

Some good, some bad, some indifferent and some not capable of exercising strong leadership. This then, reduces the problem to the level of Masonic Leadership, a topic which has been well covered many times here, and yet is intertwined to the point that is becomes inseparable.

After all, we do have the candidate first, we initiate him and guide his progress for a period of two months and upwards. What impressions do we make to instill our philosophy and doctrine in him? We know what the Shrine, Scottish Rite, York Rite and Eastern Star will do. We, in many instances, choose to lay the decline of Blue Lodge interest and membership at their door-step and yet have we considered the competition of sundry service clubs, school events, bowling leagues, country club activities and last and certainly not least, that which to me should be most despised of all, television. We have failed to inspire our initiates to a point where an easy chair and such programs as "Welcome back, Kottar, Sanford and Son, Policewoman and the Six Million Dollar Man", to name but a few, can be equated with an evening of Masonic fellowship, Brethren, by acknowledging the problem at this level makes us aware that our Masonic appendages are not the problem. At this point, I believe that they are in reality carrying the load of growth and mere survival. Yes, unquestionably we have applicants for membership who have as their goal membership in the Scottish and York Rites and the Shrine, but never forget we have them first. If they are good men I do not feel they should be denied, for if we do our ritualistic work, show

fellowship and interest and involve them, we will make good active members of them. All too often members move on and become active in the other bodies for the simple reason that that is where they are offered the opportunity to actively participate.

Let's examine the average lodge in Wyoming. The membership roster will show 207 members. The most surprising fact I found was that 40%, or 84 members, have moved and reside elsewhere. This then leaves us with 123 potential people to attend each regular meeting. Twelve, hopefully, will be there as the officers. 111 then could be on the side lines. Are they? . . . Well then, where are they? All at Chapter, Rite Meetings, Shrine Ceremonials? Hardly, my brethren, for these bodies meet but once generally each month and rarely conflict with the Blue Lodge meeting night. Evidently we must have a program to get these 111 members involved. Whether it be lectures and degree work or committee assignments. Our task did not end when we raised that candidate. We, of a necessity, must keep him an integral part of our lodge work. If we don't, we can't complain if the other bodies seize the opportunity and do involve him, his interests, and his time.

I'd like to make one other small point at this time, perhaps it will place in context and give some of you a slightly different outlook on these other organizations.

I know of a member, have known him for years. His attendance at lodge is sporadic, he comes for special events, but not much else. This has been his record for the past 15-20 years and yet everyone regards him as a great guy. Why? He is Chapter Dad of the local DeMolay. Yet why is his lack of attendance at Blue Lodge more easily accepted or explained than that of the active Rite Mason, Shrine or Star member?

All things are relative, but we must be consistent. **MAKE GOOD MEN BETTER.** Be it for man or for boy, . . . they also serve.

I agree not with the trite old saw, "We need more Masonry in men, not more men in Masonry," I believe we just happen to need more of both. An organization which is atrophying cannot long stay viable. By our lack of leadership too many Masons have substituted the 24 inch TV tube for the 24 inch gauge.

In times past the local Masonic lodge was the focal point of the smaller towns' society and social life. I had the distinct pleasure of listening to a 50-year pin recipient in one of our smaller lodges reminence just last month about the fact that when he joined his lodge he rode 40 miles horseback to take his degrees. No more, with modern vehicles and improved roads our members are able to traverse our areas to practically any function they wish. Perhaps the energy crisis in future years will be able to do for us

what we are unable to do now. If the mobility of our members is restricted, perhaps they will turn their attention to their mother lodge and realize the fellowship they are missing. Yet again, it will take more than opening, degree work and closing to keep their attention and participation. Our strong lodges are the ones with good interesting programs at least once a month or whenever they don't have degree work. They are also the ones who are proficient in their degree work.

I can speak only of my knowledge of Masonic organizations in Wyoming, but I am sure it does not vary too much in your jurisdictions. The people in the York Rite, Scottish Rite and Shrine see that the members are involved and committed. There is degree work, degree teams and practices in the Rites, and to face cold hard facts, a dangling hope, the carrot of reward in terms of recognition with honorary degrees. A contradiction of Masonic principles? Perhaps, but also most effective. In the Shrine there is that pageantry and costuming which appeals to the boy ever present in all men, coupled with this are the inner bodies of clowns, buggies, motorcycle drill teams, charitable causes, and on and on. But to belabor the point, the man is active and feels useful and needed. Instead of sitting back knocking these people, lets learn from them. **LET'S SET THE CRAFT TO LABOR.** We need the leadership to present interesting programs and to see to it that our Blue Lodge members become involved.

How about asking that foremost of authorities on every subject?

P.S. Do you think she might be soliciting?

Miss Landers might reply as follows:

Dear Slipped:

I've used the past tense, because from your letter I think you're already there. I can't answer about your sister, but to start with I need these answers about yourself.

1. Is your appearance and your home neat and clean?
2. Do you make a concerted effort to make a good impression on your friends?

3. Are you well informed and intelligent to visit with?
4. Are you enthusiastic?

The first impressions you make are most important. If you are interesting to be with and actually interested in your friends, knowledgeable and able to communicate, your boyfriends will stay. Even if your glamorous sister does solicit them, if you have built a good base for a long friendship, they will not forget you. Don't be a square, but encompass them.

Maybe this imaginary letter is too frivolous an approach, but it really does state the problem. Glamour and attention are tough competitors, but an active interest in and participation by our brethren will rekindle their interest.

We should remember that during the years following World War II when we experienced phenomenal growth that no one complained about the related bodies and their activities, only now, when decline has set in, do we look for the "fall guy" to point the finger of accusation at to explain our reasons for loss of membership.

One point, strictly sales promotion, and yet a mis-nomer which I believe we can and should correct through the Rite Bodies. They are NOT the "higher degrees", but only further or explanatory degrees.

When we move to the subtitle of "Effective Communication", I am going to have to confess or perhaps express my gratitude and thanks to be able to say that at least in Wyoming this has presented no problem for me. In every phase of Masonry or the appendant bodies, I have been accorded the most courteous and sincere cooperation that could be asked for. I personally am a great believer in face to face meetings whenever possible. Telephone and letters are to be used only when absolutely necessary. I realize that our small membership, small number of lodges and only two Scottish Rite Bodies and two Shrine Temples make my personal task in this regard much easier than a good number of the other jurisdictions, but the basic cooperation is there.

The Appendant Bodies realize, I know, that the decline of membership in the Grand Lodge must ultimately be reflected in their own growth curve. In personal visits with their hierarchy, their concern has been stressed. It may have been that in times past we received only lip service from them, but their awareness of the problem of our general decline which is about to overtake them also has changed this attitude from a passive to an active interest in Blue Lodge Masonry.

The answer to the question posed by this paper's title is a resounding, YES, the Appendant and Concordant Bodies do and will continue strengthening Masonry.

Be not too hasty to condemn our Brethren in these orders if they are active and participating where they are, for as I said at the beginning, we all strive for the same purpose. **TO MAKE GOOD MEN BETTER.**

And remember also, as it was so aptly said by Henry David Thoreau, in his book, "Walden":

"If a man does not keep pace with his companions, perhaps, it is because he hears a different drummer. Let him step to the music he hears, however measured or far away."

"MASONIC IMAGE — How to improve the public Masonic image or to create a proper one in the community. How can we enhance it not only as Blue Lodge Masons but as Grand Lodge Officers?"

Any discussion of what we here refer to as a "Masonic Image" requires that we first have a clear understanding of the meaning and definition of that phrase.

Webster defines image as, "a reproduction or imitation of the form of a person or a thing". It is also defined as "a tangible or visible representation", and we now must determine what we really mean when we ask how and by what means we are able to answer these questions. To be sure, we project an image in our communities, not only as citizens but as Freemasons and that image is either favorable or unfavorable.

The growth and perpetuation of Freemasonry leads us to the conclusion that the image of our Fraternity created by our forbears was a favorable and esteemed image. And, it seems to me that it is that image which we, who live in this era, must attempt to emulate by precept and example.

Let us examine, for a moment, the public image of our brethren who have gone before us. We find that they were true Masons, not only by what they said, but by their actions and deeds. Are we willing to sacrifice and suffer deprivation today so that the freedom to practice Masonry which we enjoy may survive? Are we willing to forego some of the pleasure which our earthly body craves in order to emulate the image which we create in our several communities? When we talk of Masonic image are we able to equate that with Genesis 1:27, where we are told that God created man in His own image?

My brethren, when we are capable of answering these and similar questions in the affirmative, it is my humble opinion that we need have no further concern as to the public image of Masonry. We need to rededicate our lives so that our actions in our daily dealings with our fellow man will immediately point us out as someone set apart, someone who demonstrates compassion and charity, not because he must but because of the desire instilled in him by his Masonic teachings. In short, my brethren, let us display to the world the values which we have received in our obligations as a Mason.

I am reminded of the context in which the word "image" was once used by Herbert Brownell, a former Attorney General of the United States who said, "a disorderly courtroom can seriously tarnish a community's image of justice". I think we may justifiably conclude that a disorderly Mason in his intercourse with the world and with his brethren can seriously tarnish the image of Masonry. It is, therefore, incumbent on every man who wears the Square and Compass to avoid the slightest appearance of being disorderly in his daily communication with his fellow man.

Master Masons, often referred to as Blue Lodge Masons, a term which I reject, must be orderly as that word in its present context implies, in business transactions, personal habits, social and community activities and in general be a productive force in the community. We have no right to detract from the image of Masonry which we have long enjoyed.

The question is posed as to how Grand Lodge Officers can enhance the image of Masonry. We should always remember that we are Master Masons — no more, no less. We must surely realize that the brethren look to the Grand Lodge Officers for example and leadership and, therefore, it behooves those officers to avoid at all costs any appearance or conduct which would detract from the lessons which our members are taught. I earnestly believe that a Grand Lodge Officer is and should be held to a higher degree of upright conduct than his less exalted brethren. If the Grand Lodge Officers allow themselves to be seen or heard in a manner which is unbecoming of a Mason the image of Masonry will be seriously damaged.

Masonry must exploit to the fullest every opportunity to publicly display those portions of our ritual which are so intended. I refer specifically to conducting Masonic funerals, the dedication and laying of cornerstones of Masonic and public buildings and attendance at church services as Masons. Masons should be involved in civic affairs at all levels and especially the operation of our public schools.

From time to time we are urged by a few short sighted members of the craft to relax the high standards and ideals which we require of petitioners. These suggestions are made in good faith

but I submit that any relaxation in our requirements for admission and retention of membership would soon lead us into oblivion. If our standards are to be modified let us strengthen them — let us hold our members to a higher degree of morality and virtue. And, my brethren, I am convinced that we need to be more diligent in our recommendations for membership and in our investigations of petitioners. We will fail to enhance the image of Masonry if we neglect the lessons taught in the four cardinal virtues of Temperance, Fortitude, Prudence and Justice. By the application of mind to govern and discipline ourselves by the use of reason and moderation in action, thought and word we acquire the strength and thereby we are enabled to conform to the principles of Freemasonry.

I conclude my remarks with the poem, "At Day's End" by John Hall —

Is anybody happier because you passed his way?
Does anyone remember that you spoke to him today?
The day is almost over, and its toiling time is through;
Is there anyone to utter now a kindly word of you?
Can you say tonight, in parting with the day that's
slipping fast,
That you helped a single brother of the many that
you passed?
Is a single heart rejoicing over what you did or said;
Does the man whose hopes were fading, now with
courage look ahead?
Did you waste the day, or lose it? Was it well or
sorely spent?
Did you leave a trail of kindness, or a scar of
discontent?
As you close your eyes in slumber, do you think
that God will say,
"You have earned one more Tomorrow by the
work you did today"?

**REPORT OF THE BOARD
OF GENERAL PURPOSES**

**TO THE GRAND LODGE OF FREE AND
ACCEPTED MASONS OF NEW BRUNSWICK:**

Three meetings of the Board were held during the year. These were on May 31/75, Jan. 10/76 and Mar. 6/76.

At the first meeting R: W: Brother D. M. Richards, Sr. Gr. Warden was elected vice. Pres. of the Board. R: W: Brother C. H. Jarvis Dep. G. M. presided at all meetings.

The amount of \$6000.00 was authorized and allotted for scholarships, by the scholarship committee. The Grand Master named all committees at the first meeting of the Board.

The Ritual Committee, under the chairmanship of M: W: P:G:M: Speight has written an installation ceremony for Grand Lodge Officers, which was accepted by the Board.

M: W: Brother A. C. Lemmon, who has served the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick well and faithfully for eighteen years as Grand Secretary, submitted his resignation to be effective as of December 31, 1975. The Board was pleased to confirm the Grand Master's decision to appoint him as Grand Secretary Emeritus.

The Grand Master appointed R: W: Brother T. Giles Allan as Grand Secretary. His appointment commenced on January 1, 1976.

The matter of the W. G. Quinn Estate is still under review and is in the hands of the barristers appointed by the Board of General Purposes.

The Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master and Grand Secretary were in attendance at the annual conference of Grand Master's and Grand Secretaries of North America, held this year at Philadelphia. A full report on this accompanies the report of the Grand Master.

Proposed amendments of the Constitution and General Regulations have been submitted to the Board and recommended for the consideration of the Grand Lodge.

REPORT OF THE RITUAL COMMITTEE

TO THE MOST WORSHIPFUL THE GRAND MASTER,
OFFICERS AND MEMBERS OF
THE GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

In bringing you this report, my first as Chairman of the Ritual Committee, I would like first of all to pay tribute to my predecessor, Most Worshipful Past Grand Master Ralph T. Pearson, who so capably filled this office with dignity and devotion from the year 1972 until March of 1975 when he was called to the Celestial Lodge above. Always friendly and willing to help, he was a member of the Ritual Committee from the year 1956 — 19 years of dedicated service to the Craft in general and to this Grand Jurisdiction in particular. He is sadly missed by all.

We'll not forget thee, we who stay
To work a little longer here;
Thy name, thy faith, thy love shall lie
On memory's tablet, bright and clear;
And when o'er wearied by the toil
Of life, our heavy limbs shall be,
We'll come, and one by one, lie down
Upon dear Mother Earth with thee.

During the year District meetings have been held as follows:

October 18th	District No. 5	St. George

At each of these meetings members of the Ritual Committee were in attendance to answer questions and assist in improving Ritual work. We would once again strongly recommend that each District Deputy Grand Master give serious consideration to the holding of these meetings and would suggest that the Ritual Committee be consulted in advance as to time and place, if their presence is desired, so that suitable plans can be made for their attendance.

In the report of 1972 it was suggested that, "There be a Ritual Committee in every Subordinate Lodge and at least one member present at all hehearsels. He should correct all errors on the spot." We feel that this bears repeating and that it should definitely be a requisite in all Lodges and again strongly recommend it.

Since 1970 present Ritual work in the Entered Apprentice degree has been under consideration with a view to making it more impressive and interesting both to the Candidate and to the Brethren attending, and this has again been given some thought by your Committee and the Board of General Purposes. This is a very lovely degree and one that is most difficult to find room for improvement in, but some further discussion is expected in the coming year and this Committee would be most grateful for any and all suggestions that might assist in this regard.

Further thought and study has been given to the advisability of adopting a form of ceremony for Public or Semi-Public Installation of Officers in Subordinate Lodges in this Grand Jurisdiction and at a meeting of the Board of General Purposes held on January 10, 1976 the following motion was presented and adopted: "That Craft Lodges be permitted Semi-Public or Public Installations provided they be conducted by the Grand Master, or a Past Grand Master delegated by the Grand Master, on a one year trial basis." Your Committee concurs with this resolution and would recommend that it receive the approval of this Grand Lodge.

The Installation Ceremony for Grand Lodge Officers has again been under review and a submission made to the Board of General Purposes at their last meeting on March 6th has been approved and will be used later today when your Grand Lodge Officers are installed for the year 1976-77.

As stated many times before, the Members of the Ritual Committee are pleased and happy to welcome suggestions from any of the Brethren that may improve Masonry in New Brunswick and are always ready and willing to assist in any way possible in the clarification and interpretation of the work.

**CULTURE & INFORMATION REPORT TO GRAND LODGE
MAY 15, 1976**

**MOST WORSHIPFUL GRAND MASTER
DISTINGUISHED GUESTS
MEMBERS OF GRAND LODGE**

It is with pleasure that I have the privilege and honor of reporting to this Grand Lodge on behalf of the Culture & Information Committee.

Your full committee met with the District Deputies in Fredericton in August 1975. At this meeting the duties of the District Deputies as well as the program for the various districts within the jurisdiction was fully discussed. In September 1975 your committee prepared and, together with the assistance of our Grand Secretary, distributed a booklet entitled "Looking to the East". This booklet outlined "in depth" preparation of the Senior Warden for the office of Worshipful Master.

District meetings were attended by members of your committee whenever possible, but I must apologize that on three occasions I personally was unable to attend, twice because of previous appointments and once because of inclement weather.

At the District meetings assistance and guidance is given to presiding Masters and Wardens for the betterment of lodge practices. Concern is hereby registered for better coordination by the District Deputies in date selection for District Meetings.

During the year it has been necessary to reprint the four booklets which are presented to the candidate upon acceptance and after each degree has been received by the candidate. This manner of disseminating Masonic information to the candidate has been very successful and much appreciated by the candidates. The committee is of the opinion that District Deputies should insist that the appropriate booklets be presented to each candidate immediately after receiving the respective degree.

It is recognized that a substantial bequest has recently been made for the establishment and operation of a Masonic home to be known as "The Quinn Home". It is further recognized by your committee that the desirability of complying with this request appears questionable. We would therefore suggest as an alternative that "A Circulating Masonic Library" be established for this jurisdiction and it could be known as "The Quinn Library". A Special Library Committee is suggested to be appointed by the Board of General Purpose to investigate the feasibility of establishing such a library.

During the year some concern has been expressed relative to activities of "Investigating Committees".

We would suggest that next years Culture & Information Committee do an in depth study of Investigating Committee within the jurisdiction and report their findings and recommendation to this Grand Lodge at our next Annual Session.

Your committee has also been concerned relative to the lack of advance preparation by our lodges officers for regular and special meetings. We would therefore recommend that the Wardens of each lodge be invited to attend "A Wardens Meeting" to be held in conjunction with and at the same time as, the District Deputy Grand Masters Annual Meeting in August. Programming for such a meeting would of necessity be more explicit and detailed than those for only District Deputies.

The Culture and Information Committee would like to take this opportunity to express our sincere thanks and gratitude to our Grand Secretary Emeritus and New Brunswick's Dean of Masonry for the assistance and counsel he has given to us throughout the years. It is our fondest hope that Bert Lemmon will enjoy many years of good health and happiness in his retirement.

The Secretary, Bro. Maurice P. Shaw of Albion Lodge No. 1 has provided details of the following:

On Wednesday, January 21, 1976, Albion Lodge No. 1, F. & A.M. celebrated their Sesquicentennial Anniversary marking 150 years of active Masonry in their historic old lodge. Ceremonies were observed in the Masonic Temple, Germain Street, Saint John City with the Worshipful Master James D. McKenna in the East.

I am indebted to Rt. Wor. Bro. Geo. M. Smith, Junior Grand Warden for providing the following report:

Our sister and adjacent jurisdiction, the Grand Lodge of Prince Edward Island, F. & A.M. celebrated their Centennial Anniversary covering a period of one week at various points throughout the Province, culminating with the convocation of the Grand Lodge being held at the Charlottetown Hotel in that City on Friday and Saturday, June 28 and 29, 1975.

The event is of particular historical interest to the Masonic Fraternity of New Brunswick inasmuch as the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick constituted and installed the first Grand Lodge Officers of Prince Edward Island. This custom has been followed out and continued without interruption for the past 100 years. It is interesting to note that first installation in 1875 was made by the then M. W. Grand Master J. V. Ellis and that 50 years afterward in 1925 at the celebration of their fifty years the installation was made by his son Most Wor. Grand Master George D. Ellis.

The convocation was largely attended with over 300 delegates from various Provinces of Canada, the U.S.A. and Costa Rica.

New Brunswick had a large delegation of visitors headed by Most Worshipful Grand Master Earle B. Ross. Accompanying him were Most Wor. Past Grand Masters J. Stewart Brooks; Most Wor. Grand Secretary A. C. Lemmon; Rt. Wor. Bro. W. J. Bam-bury our Grand Representative of P. E. I. at New Brunswick; Rt. Wor. Brothers D. Richards; Geo. M. Smith; H. I. Webb; A. Gaskin and others.

Following completion of business an open installation of newly elected and appointed officers was held on Saturday evening June 29th. Installation was made by M. W. Grand Master Ross assisted by R. W. Bro. W. J. Bam-bury as Grand Director of Ceremonies and Sr. Gr. Warden D. Richards and Jr. Gr. Warden Geo. M. Smith in their respective stations until installation of P. E. I. officers. Most Wor. Grand Master of "The Island" is Frederick R. Hickey.

- (8) November 22nd Albion #1 and St. John's #2 at Saint

John. At this meeting of Nov. 22nd which was sponsored by two lodges, St. John's and Albion, there was a highlight which pleased the team greatly. Rt. Wor. Bro. John A. W. Ramsay, D.D.G.M., Dist. VII who was in the chair for the team's work, was presented with a gavel to be used by the Team in its travels. This gavel was a beautiful piece of Bird's-eye maple designed and made by P.G.M. Maurice Wm. Dalton. It had a neat brass plate attached with an inscription commemorating the occasion of this visit to the two lodges. This is the first acquisition of tangible property by the Moncton Keltic Degree Team and serves as a symbol to give an identity as an existing entity. It is much appreciated by the Team.

2. Astronaut Leroy Gordon Cooper, 33° and K.T. Carbondale Lodge No. 82 Carbondale, Colorado. Flights Mercury and Liberty Bell. His father was a member. Had a Masonic funeral by Carbondale Lodge.

3. Astronaut Donn F. Eisele, Luther B. Turner Lodge No. 732 Columbus, Ohio, raised by his father, was a Sr. Warden. Flew in Apollo 7. His father Herman was a Past Master, Secretary and a member of Aladin Temple, also a Knight Templar.
4. Astronaut Virgil I. Grisson, a 32° Mitchell Lodge No. 228, Mitchell, Indiana. Member of Chapter, Council and Commandry at Orlando, Florida. Died tragically on 1-27-67 in Apollo Space Ship fire at Cape Kennedy.
5. Astronaut "Wally" M. Schirra Jr., 33° Made a Master Mason "on sight" at Jacksonville, Florida. Flew Mercury 8; Gemini; Apollo 7 spacecraft. His father raised Dec. 11-1965 Pt. Loma, California.
6. Astronaut Thomas P. Stafford, Western Star Lodge No. 138 Weatherford, Oklahoma. R.A.M. 1963. Been to moon but did not land. Apollo 10 GT 6 and Apollo-Soyuz Test Project Mission. His father Dr. T. S. Stafford was a Master of Western Star Lodge 1923. His mother Matron OES 1927. Received 50 year pin 1968.
7. Astronaut Edgar D. Mitchell, Lt. Commander U.S.N. Artesia Lodge No. 28 New Mexico. Was a DeMolay Master Councillor, received Chavalier Award. Apollo 14 flight. 2nd MASON ON THE MOON. His brother Jay N. Mitchell, Artesia Lodge No. 28 was a DeMolay Master Councillor, Capt. U.S.A.F. His father J. T. Mitchell Past Master Artesia Lodge; Secretary; D.D.G.M. Dad of DeMolay. R.A.M. 1966
8. Astronaut Paul J. Weitz, Laurence Lodge, Erie, Pennsylvania No. 708. Flew Skylab 1

Astronauts not masons but whose fathers are:- Alan Shepard, John Glenn, Vince Brand, Wm. Poguo, Anthony W. England, F. Storey Musgrave and Neil A. Armstrong.

In addition to the above information, Mr. Wm. Drewes, Head, Special Activites Group, Astronaut Office, N.A.S.A. has kindly sent a generous supply of autographed color photos of the celebrated astronauts together with various pictures of spaceships, earth and the moon.

In closing, may I express my appreciation to the many lodge secretaries who have so faithfully sent their monthly notices of Communication and other fraternal activities.

During the past year a considerable number of brethren were presented with bars, jewels or certificates marking their long service careers. This list of members is given in the Report of the Grand Master.

Mr. Barry was thanked for his inspiring address by M: W: Bro. M. W. Dalton. Immediately following the luncheon the Grand Lodge adopted a motion by R: W: C. H. Jarvis that the address by Mr. Barry be printed in full in the proceedings.

ADDRESS BY MR. BARRY

MR. TOASTMASTER

I come here today not to flatter nor to ridicule, neither to praise nor to condemn. I come here in all sincerity as an enthusiastic fraternalist privileged to address dedicated fraternalists. I come here firm in the belief that fraternal societies with their high ideals and noble purposes, and motivated by a true spirit of brotherly love, can become a tremendous force for good in the communities in which they are established.

In these days of material crises — of moral, social, economic and political tensions — as Masons and as Knights of Columbus, we must come to the full realization that as fraternal societies, we are also in a period of crisis! We are, I suggest, at a serious crossroad in our journey — our efforts if you will — to continue the promulgation of the principles for which we stand.

We are members of two of the great institutions on the face of the earth. Both institutions are armed with ideals and principles that should motivate all of our members in our on-going quest to make this a better world, and specifically, to make the communities

in which we live a better place. We have glorious and noble heritages — ones that have demonstrated for all the world the true power a society has when united in a common purpose.

Yet despite this proud heritage of accomplishments, and despite being equipped with the tools that should continue this tradition of service to God and man, we are in serious danger of losing our way. We are truly at the crossroads of our journey. Are we to continue on the road to sacrifice? Are we to continue on the road of selflessness — of concern for our fellow-man? Shall we continue to be dedicated fraternalists who hold fast to the principles on which we were founded — no matter what odds? Shall we continue to hold high the standards that exists in the minds and hearts of all decent peoples?

Or shall we succumb to the so-called modern concept that fraternal societies are on their way out? Are we — as they say — behind the times? Are we just social organizations? Are we now indifferent for whatever cause, not from a lack of knowledge, but from carelessness, from absorption in other pursuits, from a contempt bred of self-satisfaction? Are we apathetic? Are we among the silent majority, silent because it is convenient, or because we are lazy? Are we losing our desire, our hunger, to persevere on behalf of our Masonic and Columbian ideals?

I would be surprised if many among you did not think me rude and presumptuous and perhaps even ignorant and insulting, and you may unequivocally denounce my questioning, my probing. You will loudly proclaim your allegiance to the fundamental principles of your society — and you will be right! We have gathered in this room the leaders of the Free and Accepted Masons in New Brunswick and some of the leaders of the Knights of Columbus and I am confident that every one of YOU have demonstrated YOUR dedication over the years. But let us pause! Let us look at the “troops”. Let us look at the ordinary member if you will. Let us ask ourselves some pertinent and possibly embarrassing questions! How many of our members attend meetings with any degree of regularity? How many of our members become involved in meaningful activities, as opposed to those who attend our social functions? How does the number who have joined our ranks in recent years compare with those who have separated from our societies? How does the number who have joined our ranks compare with those who really become active? How many young people do we attract? How many members of DeMolay and the Columbian Squires become Masons and Knights? How many of our members are deeply involved in the activities of other societies and groups? And have we asked ourselves “Why”? How many of our members are really and truly proud to be members of the Masons and the Knights? And even more important, would our communities suffer any loss should we decide to close our doors? Are we relevant in today's world?

I could go on asking many such thought-provoking questions about our societies — questions that I am sure you, as leaders, have been asking yourselves — for you know it is only through such true self-examination that we will find the complete answer. And yet we all know the answer to my questions! We must realize we are in a period of crisis — we are at the crossroads!

I know that on the one hand I am praising your societies, its members, its heritage, its accomplishments, its principles, and its ideals — and rightly so! And on the other hand, I am raising serious questions of present day accomplishments and dedication. Oh yes, we raise funds for worthwhile causes, and we sell books of chance, and raffle tickets, and have other money making projects. And once in awhile we make a charitable donation. But is this to be the full extent of the participation of the general membership? Is this what we have come to stand for? Surely our principles demand much more than this!

We have a common principle which motivates both our great societies — brotherly love — fraternity. In light of what is happening in these days of crisis do we not have a great obligation and responsibility to bring about a rededication of this principle to our members, and through them to our communities? And do we not have a great opportunity to unite in a common cause under the banner of fraternity for the benefit of our neighbours?

Who among us is not sickened at what is happening throughout this land — at what is becoming for many an accepted way of life? Are we not appalled at the slow, but certain, encroachments that are eating away the moral fibres of Christian living? The moving words of St. Paul to his disciple Timothy in the first century should have a peculiar interest for us in these crucial days of the twentieth century. These were: “Pay close attention to how you live. Don't live like ignorant men, but like wise men. Make good use of every opportunity you get, because these are bad days”. And I suggest, these are bad days in which most of us take our democracy for granted, while far too many confuse freedom with license and express themselves through violence, terrorism and vandalism. And there are those who hold high office in their particular organizations who not only challenge authority, but persuade their ill-informed colleagues to defy the law of the land. Crime statistics soar annually while our courts and parole boards continue to find technicalities whereby criminals, known to be guilty of vicious crimes, are turned loose to prey on society. Uncontrolled inflation has widened the gap between the rich and the poor and has made inroads at dividing our peoples, creating mistrust and resentment. We are a divisive peoples with labour pitted against management, welfare recipients against non-recipients, the unemployed against the employed, the “haves” against the “have-nots”. We are plagued with problems of housing, pollution, education, law and order,

energy. Our political leaders seem to drift from crisis to crisis in the hope that they will somehow stagger upon a solution. We allow the filthiest trash to be displayed on our news stands and to be shown on television and in theatres which seduce the immature and has led to a permissiveness and depravity unknown to our fathers. The break-up of the family unit has reached staggering proportions, while psychologists voice more concern in advocating legislation allowing individuals of the same sex to live together. Economic and social pressures cause many parents to find escape in alcohol while their sons and daughters revolt against the establishment through drugs. There seems to be a crisis of leadership in every field of activity. And we in this country have the additional burden of having among us those who sow the seeds of disunity between French and English speaking citizens — always emphasizing the differences, never — the common denominators. It certainly appears that these are bad times!

And yet the thoughts and feelings of decent people have not changed! They are still disgusted at immoral and unnatural deviations and they are concerned about what is happening in our society. Yes, decent people are crying out for a means of overcoming this permissive and liberal movement. Decent people are groping for a means to bring about a return to decent living, decent people are looking for leadership! And you and I can provide that leadership by uniting in a common cause.

Let us return to our Lodges and Councils and persuade our members to unite under a common banner for the good of our communities. Let our societies establish civic committees that will work together to make better communities. Let us study together the problems that plague us, determine the priorities and seek solutions. Let us together instill a sense of community and national pride in our neighbours. Let us together become involved in the meaningful programs so desperately needed in every community. Let us together restore hope for decent people everywhere!

Harnessing the abilities and energies of our memberships in this province in each community we can bring about a change for good that has long endured in the hearts and minds of decent people. And our accomplishments, and example, will be such that the people of our communities, of New Brunswick, of Canada, will be forever in our debt. And it will activate our memberships to a degree never before known!

It is a strange fact that those who strive for good never receive headlines — and seldom any thanks. But if they present their ideas factually, intelligently, patiently, constructively, persistently and with good will, a great deal will be accomplished. You and I would never abandon our organizations to the corrupt, the incompetent, the complacent. Nor must we abandon our communities to them.

Working together our influence for good can be far-reaching — but only if, with God's help — we make it felt. That is the challenge. And I am convinced that as loyal and dedicated Masons and Knights we are capable of working together to meet this pressing challenge.


