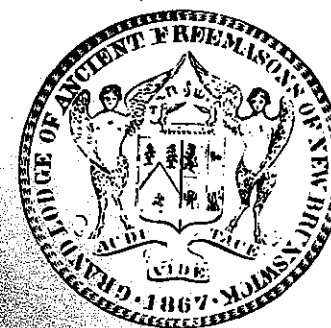

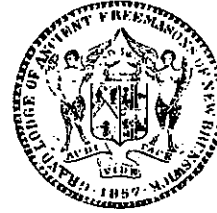

## SERVICE OF WORSHIP AND THANKSGIVING

May 10, 1985

Very Worshipful Rev. John Jarvie, B.A. B.D. Grand Chaplain  
 Devotional Address  
 "BROWSING IN THE LIGHT"

One Sunday morning I was lingering in the narthex of the church I usually attend. One of the ushers, who I know well, said to me - "Are you going in, or are you just browsing?" Of course I had him usher me to a seat at once.

But his question intrigued me. To what extent am I guilty of nibbling around the edges instead of really getting involved? But isn't it true that finding some tasty morsel leads us to seek more of the same - that's how we really become involved in anything, isn't it? Maybe this would be a good subject for this address to Grand Lodge. Wouldn't that be carrying coals to Newcastle? Surely all attending Grand Lodge have something more than a casual interest in Freemasonry! Then I came across a definition of browsing as being 'to pore over a book'. That had possibilities.

I recall an incident from my days as a student on a summer mission field. I was visiting a man who told me that he had had a call from a book salesman. Rather proudly he told me that he had easily handled the sales pitch. "I told him", he said, "I have a book", and he pointed proudly to a Bible sitting high on the wall on the clock shelf. And I remember thinking, "Yes, you have a book. But do you have any knowledge of what it says? Do you read it or does it only grace the shelf?"

We have a Book that graces every Masonic Altar. We call it the Great Light of Freemasonry. The attention of every aspirant to the secrets of our order is directed to it when he is first brought to light at the altar. He is advised that it is the rule and guide to our faith and practice. Of that book the Psalmist says, 'Thy word is a lamp unto my feet and a light unto my path.'

A supplementary lecture on the Scriptures in the ritual of the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia says in part -

"Freemasonry takes all good men by the hand and, leading them to its altars, points to the open Bible thereon, and urges upon each that he faithfully direct his steps through life by the light he there shall find." And it further urges, "Live according to its divine teachings with its everlasting assurance of a blessed immortality."

Because we frequently read reports that the Bible is still the world's best seller, but is not read much, and because I am convinced that we need the assurances we find in the Bible to help us cope with the tensions of our day, I propose to spend some time in that Light which hold such a prominent place in Freemasonry. I want to look at some of the things it has to say about that God in whom we are all expected to place our trust, and about His creature, man.

The Bible uses many pictures in it's attempt to describe God's relationship to the universe. He is the architect, or master builder, planning and supervising the most ambitious of all building projects - the world. Or he is the potter who shapes and forms the world as the potter shapes and forms the vessels on his wheel. But the most familiar picture is that which we find in the first chapter of Genesis. "In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth." So this magnificent Creation Hymn begins - and let us remember that it is a hymn and not a scientific theory. In its intention it neither contradicts nor needs to be reconciled with the scientific picture of the world came to its present form. It seeks to ask and to answer questions that go behind all our scientific questions. Why does the



world exist? It came into being, claims this hymn, as an expression of the will of an all-powerful God. The psalmist puts it this way -

'By the word of the Lord the heavens were made,  
and all their host by the breath of his mouth.  
He gathered the waters of the sea as in a bottle,  
he put the deeps in storehouses.  
Let all the earth fear the Lord,  
let all the inhabitants of the world stand in awe  
of him!

For he spoke and it came to be  
he commanded and it stood forth.'

(Ps. 33:6-9 RSV)

And the refrain that runs through that hymn is one of rejoicing - "and God saw that it was good." One writer describes the Biblical view of creation as a picture of such divine exhilaration as forces us, if we are asked summarily why God made the world, to affirm that HE MADE IT FOR FUN. There is no purpose in it save the purpose of joy; the joy of the Maker in the joy of his making, and the derived and reciprocal joy of the world in itself and in Him who made it."

A. Millar, "The Renewal of Man"

But this Creator God isn't one who once, 'in the beginning' demonstrated his creative power. The God of the Bible is no celestial engineer who invents the complicated mechanism of the world, sets it in motion, then leaves it to run according to its own momentum. Creation is not some past event, but a continuing work of God. Everything existing now depends upon and witnesses to the ever present Creator God. The Bible speaks of a God who, standing outside the world as its Creator, is yet ever present creatively in this world which in the beginning he created.

Moreover, the claim is made that there can be no other effective Gods. Listen to the writer of the second section of Isaiah -

'For thus saith the Lord  
who created the heavens ....  
"I am the Lord and there is no other."

(Is. 45:18)

The Bible, you see, has a hard core of intolerance in it, developing the conviction that the God who created everything is the only true God. Some people have difficulty with this, claiming that there must be more than one route to ultimate truth. But the Bible is adamant. The psalmist expresses the position well -

'For all the gods of the people are idols,  
but the Lord made the heavens.'

Ps. 96:5

We should also note that there is no image of God in the Bible - Rather a remarkable thing since it is dealing with a world in which there are innumerable images of the gods. The command given to the people is:

"You shall not make yourself a graven image, or any likeness of anything ... for I the Lord your God am a jealous God."

Exod. 20:4-5

Nothing, you see, can ever represent Him adequately - He stands forever behind and beyond the world, the source of its very existence.

Browsing in the Light, then, reveals a God who is the sole and continuing creator of all that is. This is the God we claim to trust as we set out on our journey through the mysteries of Freemasonry - and who goes with us on all life's journeyings.

My browsing in the Light also brings me to an understanding of myself as it reveals the nature of man. 'What is man?' is not merely a question raised in the Scriptures by the psalmist. It is a question that seems very much to the forefront in our present world. And quite a variety of answers are being offered - a reference in a card index system; a bit of data in a computer; a dreamer of dreams; a useful or expendable drone in a totalitarian hive or an immortal soul; a victim of hidden impulses of half-conscious desires, or a scientific animal - what is man? Who have we here?

The Bible asks the question and suggests answers.  
'O Lord what is man that you dost regard him  
or the son of man that thou dost think of him?  
Man is like a breath,  
his days are like a passing shadow.'

Ps. 144:3-4

Another psalmist suggests that God pities man because  
'he knows our frame,  
he remembers that we are dust.  
As for man his days are like grass,  
he flourishes like the flower of the field,  
for the wind blows over it and it is gone,  
and its place knows it no more.'

Ps. 103:14-16.

A breath, a passing shadow, dust, grass, a flower of the field - all symbols of frailty, of the transitoriness of human life. Man is a mortal being. Life and all our vital powers are God's gift; but they are not our permanent possession. There is a limit set against every human life. Man is seen as a unity of vital forces, a 'living being' whose life breath comes from God. He is utterly and in all parts of his being dependent upon the God who will one day withdraw from him the life that He has given, as He withdraws it from every living creature.

'When thou takest away their breath, they die  
and return to the dust.'

Ps. 104:29

Yet in spite of this frailty, the Bible tells me that I am important. Maybe that doesn't matter to some people - especially to those who have found their niche in life and feel certain that they fill it better than anyone else - but it really matters to anyone who often feels like the low man on the totem pole. Able to make a living, maybe helpful now and then, but never more than second or third best. There can be all sorts of reasons for this feeling - childhood experiences, ugly failure or a shameful deed that plagues the memory and leaves a deflated, despairing feeling, or being replaced by a computer.

But it is an eternal truth declared and constantly repeated in the Bible that no ugliness or failure or anything else can deny the fact that I am important - you are important! No matter who you are, or what you have done, or where you have come from - you are important.

When the psalmist thought about man he said,  
'What is man that thou art mindful of him,  
and the son of man that thou dost care for him?  
Yet thou hast made him a little less than God,  
and doth crown him with glory and honor,  
Thou hast given him dominion over the works of  
thy hands.'

Ps. 8:4-6

Moreover, the Genesis story tells us that not only have we been given dominion over the rest of creation, - although we often forget that it is a delegated dominion given us by God - but that man is the crowning of God's creation - made in his own image. And the Bible claims that there is no true understanding of man unless we see him in the context of his relationship with God - created by God to live in God's world, to stand in intimate personal

relationship with God. That's the glory, the importance, of man - of you and me.

Yet our browsing in the Light tells us that man is prone to forget who he is and whence he came. And we are full well aware of this forgetfulness. There are times when we lose sight of a loving God. As Leslie Brandt says,

"The clutter of materialism,  
the scream of progress,  
the pace of secularization,  
the hum of man-displacing computers,  
the fear of nuclear destruction -  
all this and more threatens to rob me of the  
significance and validity I ought to feel as a  
child of the living God.

But the essential facts haven't changed,  
only the scenery, the passing panorama.  
And according to these facts, I am important!  
I am important because he redeemed me.  
Even when I fall away from his own purposes  
to selfishly follow my own,  
He jealously and lovingly reaches out to draw me.  
back that I may be restored to him."

When I go browsing in the Light to discover who I am, this is what I find -

an important person

- made in the image of God

- in whom his Spirit dwells

- for whose salvation he sent his Son

And when God feels that I have travelled this level of time long enough, then he has for me a place in 'that house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens'. And 'not only for me but also for all who loved his appearing' (2 Tim. 4:8) to borrow Paul's words.

Let me conclude with this thought. We are aware tonight that some who have shared the mysteries of the Craft with us - some of them contributing greatly to the welfare of this Grand Lodge - are no longer with us. We have a deep sense of loss. But rather than look at our losses, can we look at our possessions? A New England poet wrote about a childless woman comforting a neighbor who had just lost a child. This is the comfort that the childless woman offered to the weeping mother: "As burdensome as the grief of loss most certainly is, there is yet one grief heavier to be borne than the grief of loss, and that's the grief of never having possessed."

So we have possessed. We have related to those who have shared this fellowship with us. And we are confident that those who mean most to us mean most to God. The scripture says, "God has not left off his kindness to the dead." (Ruth 2:20) And, again, "His kingdom is an everlasting kingdom." (Dan. 4:3). So we are reminded that God's love extends for beyond death. This evening we would let those who have gone from our midst come back through our memories. Through the world of memory they are ever with us, and in a sense there is no death.

We are not impoverished because we have possessed, we have known, and we have related. Thanks be to God! Amen.

It was moved by M: W: Bro. Oulton and seconded by M: W: Bro. Haycox that the Ballot close at 2:00 p.m. and that the election of officers be at approximately 2:30 p.m. following the Report of the Credentials Committee.

### THE GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS

Greetings, my brethren:

To the Officers and Members of this Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick and to all who are visiting here with us, Greetings and a warm cordial welcome to this 118th Annual Communication. Here may we find a reverence for that

spirit of Brotherly Love and Fellowship which has dominated my visitations within and beyond this jurisdiction. Your presence here today is an indication of your interest and respect for the fraternity. As we wend our way through the Grand Lodge business I trust you will find the deliberations enlightening and helpful. Hopefully, the business transacted will create renewed enthusiasm and dedication which will be carried back to your individual Lodges.

We are meeting here today in this oldest incorporated city in Canada, the home of the 1985 Canada Games and I am overwhelmed in my feelings of humbleness that I should have the honor of welcoming you all to this 118th Communication of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick.

### Necrology

Since our last meeting of Grand Lodge a number of our brethren have answered the call of the Great Architect to the Celestial Lodge above. Many of us have lost a close friend and the fellowship of a brother we cherished. Let us be grateful for their remembrance and thankful for their efforts while among us to promote those Masonic principles of Brotherly Love, Relief and Truth.

I think, perhaps, the ancient Greek poet expressed it well.

They need not the moon in that land of delight,  
They need not the pale Pole Star,  
The sun is bright by day and by night,  
Where the souls of the blessed are.

They till not the soil, they plow not the wave,  
They labor not never, oh, never,  
Not a tear do they shed, not a sigh do they heave,  
They are happy for ever and ever.

Great Architect, in Thy gracious keeping,  
Leave we now, These Brothers, sleeping.

Brethren it is well now that we pause in remembrance of those whom we have known as friend and brother. Will you join with me in a moment of silent respect following which the Grand Chaplain will offer a brief prayer in their memory.

### Our Distinguished Visitors

I stand in humble respect in the presence of our distinguished guests from across Canada and the New England States. Your presence adds to our assembly that prestige which makes our

fraternity pre-eminent throughout the world today. We thank you for honoring us with your presence. We trust your stay with us will be comfortable, pleasant and rewarding, that your journey home will be in safety and that your recollections of your visit in the days to come will be of happy friendships renewed and established. We are, indeed, honored to have you with us.

Among our distinguished visitors I am especially pleased to welcome a long time friend and brother from the Grand Lodge of the State of Maine, M:W: Bro. Harland Small. He will be our Guest Speaker at our Grand Lodge dinner. I am grateful to him for his acceptance of our invitation. I am certain he will bring us words of Masonic Wisdom and guidance.

### Visitations

One of the most pleasing duties of a Grand Master is the opportunity he has of visiting the Lodges in his jurisdiction and representing the Grand Lodge in other jurisdictions.

During my term of office I have been privileged to visit all Lodges in New Brunswick at least once and a number of Lodges on other occasions. The attendance on all of my visits has been outstanding and I want to express my appreciation for the support I have had on all my visits. I will not burden you with the story of all my travels. A list of visitations and dates during the year is attached to this report as an Appendix "A".

I have carried greetings on your behalf to six of our Canadian provinces and four of the New England States. On all occasions I have been warmly received and acknowledged as your Grand Master with respect and courtesy. In addition, I have carried greetings on your behalf to several concordant bodies, the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons, Luxor Temple Shrine, the Grand Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star, and the Daughters of the Nile. I have visited on occasion several Lodges in the State of Maine and extended greetings to an International meeting with the Grand Master of Maine at Princeton on April 27th.

I have had the privilege, accompanied by Grand Lodge Officers, of presenting Charters to our two newest Lodges, Granite and Abnaki; also, rededicating the Temple of St. Marks Lodge No. 5, and dedicating the new Temple at Woodstock No. 11. On a special occasion, I dedicated a new altar at St. George Lodge No. 12. I carried greetings to Miramichi Lodge, Chatham, on the occasion of their 125th anniversary. I was pleased to accept on your behalf an

invitation to represent the Grand Lodge along with Hiram Lodge No. 6 and be part of a welcoming committee to greet the arrival of Queen Elizabeth at Fredericton. I was pleased to join Ashlar Lodge when they dedicated a plaque in memory of M.W.Bro.Speight. It has been an honor for me to be asked as Grand Master to present Grand Lodge Certificates, 25 year, and 50 year pins as well as 60 year bars and a 70 year bar, at the time of my visits to different Lodges.

At the risk of repeating myself I must say that the attendance of the many brothers, and especially the Grand Lodge Officers, during my many visits has been truly outstanding. As I have said on many occasions, the support of so many brothers is evidence of the loyalty and respect you feel for this Grand Lodge. As one example shows, on the occasion of a Grand Lodge visit to Mananook Lodge No. 38 on April 6th, the Easter weekend, five of our District Deputies were present, some 20 Lodges of this jurisdiction and three from the State of Maine were represented. Approximately some seventy brothers crossed on the ferry to Grand Manan for this visit.

Accompanied by the Deputy Grand Master and the Grand Secretary I attended the All Canada Conference of Grand Masters at Winnipeg March 22 to 24. R.W.Bro.Murray also attended and presented on behalf of New Brunswick a study of the different constitutions of different jurisdictions. It is truly an inspirational and learning experience to meet with the Grand Masters of all the jurisdictions and have an opportunity to exchange fraternal information. It is also some satisfaction and comfort to learn that all jurisdictions have common problems.

### In Appreciation

Permit me to take a few minutes at this time to up-date you on the office of the Grand Secretary. Two years ago I was happy to inform you that R.W.Bro.Irvine had been appointed to office. It was an urgent appointment and I must express the appreciation of this Grand Lodge for the service he has rendered. Personal reasons necessitated his terminating full time service a year ago. I considered it a high light of my two years when I was able to induce M.W.Bro.Speight to return to the administrative circle of Grand Lodge and assume the duties of Grand Secretary. My joy was short lived. On June 25 past M.W. Bro. Speight was unexpectedly summoned to the Grand Lodge above. R.W.Bro.Irvine again came to our rescue and served until the appointment of R.W.Bro.Prescott in August last year. The office of Grand Secretary is a difficult and

demanding one and I want to express the appreciation of this Grand lodge to R.W. Bro. Irvine and to R.W. Bro. Prescott for their faithful service. We should never forget the presence of Mrs. Demmings in the Grand Secretary's office. Her faithful and knowledgeable service can not be measured in words. I have said many times I think she knows more about Masonry than most members in the jurisdiction.

Also, to my faithful travelling companions Bros. Caldwell, Kennedy and McKenzie who, with the exception of three or four occasions, have accompanied me on all my visitations in the jurisdiction, I express my deepest appreciation. They have lightened the long hours on the road for many nights and have been messengers of fraternal good will and fellowship on all our travels.

Once again this year I say to this Grand Lodge how fortunate we are to have as our District Deputies devoted and faithful brothers of the order. They are the liaison links with the various Districts and provide a valuable source of reference for Lodges in the District. I must say that the deputies have been very regular in attendance on Grand Lodge visits in their respective areas and outside as well. Four of them have now fulfilled their term of office, R.W. Bros. Clarke, McKenzie, Winter and Alward. To these Brethren, on behalf of this Grand Lodge, I thank you most sincerely for your service to the Craft.

A vote of Thanks and Appreciation, too, to the many Grand Lodge officers who have attended me on many of my visits. Your support on many occasions has been truly outstanding.

I should be remiss if I did not express my appreciation to my good wife, Trudy, who has travelled with me on occasion to other jurisdictions and has supervised the reception at home for visiting ladies. She has served as my home valet and telephone secretary and has checked me out the door as to proper dress and equipment faithfully and well. She has the clever ability to know how to keep my feet on the ground lest I should lose the common touch. For her faithful support and patient long hours of waiting I am most grateful.

### The State of the Order

As noted in my report of last year on the State of the Order, we inherited a recommendation for a study on the condition and

state of the Order. We are looking forward to the action of a committee with a five year assignment to report on the strengths and weaknesses of the fraternity in this jurisdiction. During my visitations throughout the year, I have found the individual Lodges, almost without fail, active and enthusiastic. In my term of office I have encouraged more emphasis on education on the basic principles and symbols of Masonry in the hope that wider knowledge of the craft might generate greater interest. I believe meetings conducted by the Education Committee have contributed to some success in this area. The pamphlet "Mostly Masonry" compiled and edited by R.W. Bro. Murray has also made a needed contribution to greater interest and knowledge of Masonry.

All jurisdictions throughout the nation are concerned with decline in membership. The greatest contributor here is the call of the Great Architect to the Celestial Lodge above. There is no armour against Fate so there is nothing we can do about that. The next factors of reduction are suspensions and demits and, I believe, there is something we can do there. A candidate initially comes to us with an interest in Masonry. It is up to us to nurture that interest. I would recommend that Lodges require a brother who recommends a candidate to greet that candidate on his first arrival at the door of the Lodge, and to stay with him in the anti-room until the Junior Deacon comes to relieve him. I recommend that this practice should continue through each degree so that no candidate is ever left alone while awaiting the pleasure of the Lodge. Furthermore, I do recommend that the brothers who recommend a candidate, or who investigate the application, assume responsibility for his attendance at meetings when degree work is completed. Hopefully, if we continue to show concern for the welfare of new members, we can further their interest in Masonry and, therefore, find less cause of demits and suspensions in later years. If there was enough interest for an individual to ask to join a Lodge, certainly we have to ask ourselves why that individual has become disillusioned and we must assume some responsibility for the change of attitude. No member should ever be suspended without a personal interview to either remove the cause of suspension or discover why a member is in dues arrears. If the reason is financial, is it not an occasion to use our benevolent fund and may we also apply this reasoning to the problem of demits.

I should like to recommend that an effort be made to establish better liaison between concordant bodies and that notices of suspensions and demits be sent to all concordant bodies in that particular district. This would lessen the possibility that delinquents in one body could pursue membership in another body of his choice.

Attendance in most Lodges appears to be on a normal basis. If we want to improve attendance, we must do more planning to attract interest. I would encourage Masters and their Officers to combine their efforts to set up interesting programs and, then promote them. Wishful thinking will not do it. It takes work.

Good Fellowship seems to reign supreme in all Lodges I have visited and it has been a great pleasure to extend and receive the open hand from so many brothers. Again, I encourage the brethren to carry that fellowship out into the community so that we may be recognized as Masons by our conduct and behaviour.

I am borrowing the following lines from a notice sent to me from a Lodge in the State of Connecticut.

Today I will meet life with a renewed courage,  
 Today I will put to work the philosophy that I have adopted  
 the religion that I claim,  
 Today I will think more of my blessings and less of my  
 troubles,  
 Today, I will speak a good word of another, the word that I  
 failed to speak yesterday,  
 Today I will stop long enough to speak to a child.  
 Today, I will ask God to give something to somebody else,  
 The other fellow is struggling too.  
 Today, I will place a sentinel over my mouth and guard my  
 words.  
 Today, I will try to be the man I am capable of being,  
 Today, I will elevate myself morally and spiritually by acts  
 of Love, by expressions of friendship.  
 Today, I will try to be a creature fashioned in the image  
 of the Creator.  
 Today, I will give something back to life for the privilege of life.

### In Conclusion

In 1983 when I accepted the office of Grand Master, two years looked like a long time ahead. Now, today as I look back I wonder where the time has gone. It has been a time of many visitations, of hours of pleasant fellowship and friendships established for which I shall be grateful to the end of my days. Throughout my period of service I have tried to develop and follow a philosophy that is well embodied in these lines: "Let every dawn of morning be to you as the beginning of life and every setting sun as its close. Let every one of these short lives have its sure record of some kindly deed done for others. Regard every day as if it were a whole life in the miniature. So fill the hours with thought and speech and action

that you may come to the close with the memory of some good work done, some kindly things said, some act of relief to smooth troubled mind and a simple trust in God's mercy for all its failures"

The words of Edgar Guest seem appropriate:

Id'like to think when life is done  
 That I had filled a needed post,  
 That here and there I'd paid my fare,  
 With more than idle talk or boast.  
 That I had taken gifts divine,  
 The breath of life and manhood fine,  
 And tried to use them now and then  
 In service of my fellow men.

And now, my Brethren, I offer you my most humble thanks for having granted me the privilege of serving as your Grand Master. The hospitality and cooperation that I have received on all visitations have been most excellent and have shown the great respect which you bear to this Grand Jurisdiction. I would like to think that I have contributed in some creditable measure to the furtherance and betterment of the Masonic fraternity in this province of New Brunswick. I leave this office with a confident feeling for the future of the Craft and a hope to still be available to help in some way in the years ahead. Only by combined effort can we be sure that Masonry will continue to make good men better men thereby making our communities better places in which to live and our nation stronger.

May the Great Architect of the Universe stand by us and guide us in all our future actions.

I thank you again for having had the privilege of serving as your Grand Master. It has been a most respected and treasured period of my life.

As this matter had been passed at Grand Lodge once before, it was suggested that this matter be acted upon in the near future so that all subordinate Lodges will have a copy for the next installation of Officers.

Once again Brethren, your Committee is always ready to lend a helping hand to all lodges if they so request it.

I hope you will all feel free to do so in the future, so that the peace and harmony which is so entrenched in our ritual will continue so long as Freemasonry exists.

Once again M:W: Grand Master, brethren, on behalf of the Committee I say thank you for your contribution to Freemasonry in the past and hope it will continue for many years to come.

### NOTICES OF MOTION

I will move or cause to be moved that the word "member" in lines 2 - 3 of Section 9, page 54 of the Constitutions and General Regulations of the Grand Lodge of F. & A. Masons of New Brunswick be deleted and replaced with "Master Mason," and the words "the members" (line 5) be deleted and replaced with "each Master Mason".

Section No. 9 as amended will then read as follows:

"Every brother shall sign the By-laws when he becomes a Master Mason of the Lodge, as a declaration of his submission to them, and every Master Mason shall, at all reasonable times, have access to such By-laws, which should be printed for the use of the Lodge and delivered to each Master Mason."

I will move or cause to be moved that the second sentence of Section 24, page 56 be deleted and the following substituted therefor:

"Upon receiving the Master Mason Degree, he shall be entitled to voting privileges and appointments to Committees. Also to receive a copy of the By-laws of the Lodge together with a copy of the Constitutions and General Regulations of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick."

Duly explained and moved by M:W: Bro. Dalton, seconded and carried.

I will move or cause to be moved that Section 34, page 58 be deleted and the following substituted therefore:

"A Master Mason suspended for non-payment of dues, may be restored to membership, on application to the Lodge and payment of all arrears owing at the time of his suspension, and of the regular lodge dues for the period he was so suspended in accordance with the following provisions:

If the application is received within 6 (six) months of his suspension, he shall be restored immediately without a fresh ballot, however, an application received after 6 (six) months from suspension shall be governed by the usual provisions of investigation and ballot."

Following a motion by M:W:Bro. Dalton, and seconded by M:W:Bro. Haycox, discussion led to a motion by M:W: Bro. Steeves that the motion to amend Section 34 Page 58 be tabled for 1 year for further study by Jurisprudence Committee to avoid possible conflict with other sections of the Constitution.

### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FRATERNAL RELATIONS

TO THE MOST WORSHIPFUL THE GRAND MASTER,  
OFFICERS AND MEMBERS OF THE GRAND LODGE  
OF NEW BRUNSWICK, F. & A. M.

The Grande Loge du Gabon - has petitioned the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick for recognition and eventual exchange of Grand Representatives. The Grande Loge du Gabon was consecrated by the Grande Loge Nationale Francaise on the 12th of November 1983 and their constitutions have been based upon the United Grand Lodge of England. The Commission on Information for Recognition of the Conference of The Grand Masters of Masons in North America is of the opinion that the Grande Loge du Gabon having been established in accordance with the Standards of the Commission is regular and entitled to recognition. The Commissions report of February 18, 1985 informs us that this Grand Lodge now has seven Constituent Lodges and has been recognized by at least nine Grand Lodges in the United States and two Grand Lodges in Canada.

Therefore your Committee on Fraternal relations is pleased to recommend that official recognition be granted to the Grande Loge du Gabon and that an exchange of representatives be executed.

The Grand Lodge of New Brunswick in 1969 approved recognition of the Grande Loja de Guanabara, Brazil. On March 15, 1975 the geographic territory of the State of Rio de Janeiro was merged with the former state of Guanabara. We are informed that subsequently in September 1982 the Grande Loja da Guanabara ceased to function and its subordinate lodges were incorporated in-

to the Grande Loja de Estado do Rio de Janeiro, the latter now claiming sole Masonic Jurisdiction in that State.

Although advised of these events, this Grand Lodge has not been asked for recognition, however as that Grand Lodge meets the principles of recognition and being referred to favourably by the Commission on Information for Recognition of the Conference of Grand Masters of Masons in North America, your Committee recommends that the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick extend fraternal recognition to the Grande Loja de Estado do Rio de Janeiro and exchange Grand Representatives.

The Gran Logia De Espana. This Grand Lodge of Spain A.F. & A.M. was consecrated in Madrid on November 6, 1982 by the Grand Master of the Grande Loge National Francaise. This consecration was reported in detail in 1983 by The Commission in Information for Recognition of the Conference of The Grand Masters of Masons in North America, who in their February 18, 1985 annual report advise that this new Grand Lodge has been recognized by 46 Grand Lodges represented at the Conference, this recognition includes 7 of our Canadian Grand Lodges.

We are informed that The Grand Logia de Espana are determined to maintain fidelity forever to the Ancient Constitutions, Precepts and Landmarks of the Order and above all their belief in the Supreme Architect of the Universe.

Your Committee therefore recommend that the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick extend recognition to the Grand Logia De Espana and exchange representatives.

Your Committee notes that with the passage of time several vacancies now exist in our list of Grand Representatives and respectfully suggests these deficiencies be reviewed and worthy nominees selected for recommendation to the applicable Grand Jurisdictions.

### REPORT OF THE MASONIC EDUCATION COMMITTEE

MOST WORSHIPFUL THE GRAND MASTER AND MEMBERS  
OF THE NEW BRUNSWICK GRAND LODGE.

Your Grand Lodge Committee on Masonic Education submits the following report summarizing the activities of the past 12 months.

At the 1984 Communication those in attendance were given a copy of the first edition of Mostly Masonry. Although it had a limited distribution, most agreed, there was a need for such a publication. As a consequence, in June of last year, the Board of General Purposes, gave approval to a first year budget for this bulletin. We can now report to this Grand Lodge Communication that the first two editions have been distributed, January and May, and the third issue of Mostly Masonry will be out in September.

The purpose of this tri-yearly bulletin is to provide information and education features for each Mason in the 51 Craft Lodges in New Brunswick.

Another project that involved your Education Committee was the preparation of a Seminar paper for presentation to the All Canada Grand Masters Conference in Winnipeg, in March of this year. The subject of this paper was Comparisons of Canadian Constitutions, and we can report to you that this paper was well received by the members of this Conference and provided a source for much lively discussion.

Your committee was requested to conduct Masonic Education nights at Salisbury #20, Albion #1 and Zetland #24. At Alexandria #33 Fredericton, we were given an opportunity to present a preview of the Constitution paper for the All Canada Conference, and it gave your committee another opportunity to discuss Masonic Education.

On April 20th this year, at the Moncton Masonic Temple, a joint District Workshop was conducted, at the request of DDGM Lewis Clarke, District Two and DDGM Delbert Alward, District Seven. The Workshop was well attended and a variety of Masonic subjects were presented and discussed.

Education is a most important part of the life of this fraternity. The more we can learn about it, the better we will be able to appreciate and understand its many facets.

The thrust of this committee has been and will continue to be, the advancement of Masonic Education in this Grand jurisdiction. There's much yet to be done. Consideration should be given to developing a Lodge Counsellor Program to educate the new members joining the Craft, so they will better understand our Fraternity. We again hope some consideration will be given to organizing a yearly week-end Seminar involving all seven Districts,

to be held at a central location, with a planned program of education and ritual work.

In conclusion, we extend a special thanks to Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Gordon Wilmot Coffey, for his wise counsel and encouragement in the field of Masonic Education. Your committee is indebted to the Board of General Purposes for their foresight and support.

#### REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE (INCLUDING QUINN TRUST)

THE MOST WORSHIPFUL THE GRAND MASTER,

Brethren:

Your Committee has met on several occasions during the year and have studied and considered the Finances of Grand Lodge at length, including the following:- Allowances for Grand Master, Grand Secretary and District Deputy Grand Masters and Office Secretary's Salary.

We also investigated the possibility of de-registering and transfer of certain of our investment securities so that the cheques would be "the order of the day", rather than the need to cut coupons, etc., but we discovered that this would not be feasible. We therefore recommended to the Board of General Purposes that we continue to employ the Royal Trust Company to clip our Coupons and handle our investments as before. This was after we had obtained quotes for the same service from another Financial Institution.

A great deal of thought was given to the ever increasing expenses of Grand Lodge and whether or not an increase in Per Capita Tax is required. After much deliberation we were happy and relieved to recommend to the Board of General Purposes that Per Capita Tax remain at the present rate.

We did however, recommend to the Board that the \$10,000.00 in Scholarships be taken this year from the Quinn Trust Funds, rather than the Benevolent Fund.

The Library Funding would remain the same this year as recommended in last year's report.

Your Committee also recommended that the Grant to each Lodge in the Jurisdiction from the Quinn Trust Funds be increases another \$50.00 for the year 1985-86. The total including this increase would be \$550.00. per Lodge.

#### REPORT OF THE GRAND HISTORIAN

MOST WORSHIPFUL THE GRAND MASTER, DISTINGUISHED  
EAST, RIGHT WORSHIPFUL, VERY WORSHIPFUL,  
WORSHIPFUL BROTHERS AND BRETHREN ALL:

During the past two or three years, while listening at workshops, or at gatherings where you have assembled to receive our Grand Master during his official visit, I hear questions of concern regarding the public image of Freemasonry and the decline of our membership.

Your concern was directed to "the good old days" when Freemasonry had a reputation as being an organization to which good men would aspire to belong.

As your historian, I am challenged by your question and have tried, despite limited documentation, to form an opinion that may be both helpful and in itself a challenge to direct back to you.

As background, my personal interest in Freemasonry goes back to adolescence to a day when, sitting at a family dinner, there was an adult conversation that touched on Freemasonry. Father was a past master of Zion Lodge #21 about the time of the First World War. My brother-in-law was a member of Albion Lodge, my two oldest brothers were Masons. My inquiry concerning the nature of Freemasonry was ignored completely. The question was raised not from curiosity but from interest. The furor that erupted around that table delayed my candidacy for these mysteries for fifteen years. My youngest son who belongs to Demolay, relates that his school peers regard us as some mysterious cult. My point is that our poor image is to some degree of our own making. Our apparent concern for absolute secrecy is misunderstood, not only by the public, but also by many of the brethren.

If one were to ask the man-on-the-street if he had heard of the Shrine, it would not be unreasonable to expect a positive response. Ask the same person if he was familiar with the organization called Masons, it would not be unlikely to hear a less positive response. The two organizations are not connected in the public mind.

Too often the image of Freemasonry is expected to radiate from our personal activities in Church, youth groups, service clubs and other community-orientated activities. Alas, the significance of this association fails to register both in the eyes of the Mason or in the eyes of the non-mason. Each of these associations is capable of standing alone and they are not mutually dependent.

As Masons, we aspire for truth, to exchange brotherly love, and to dispense relief to those who are needy and worthy to receive. In our lodges, the symbolism of our degrees and prudent explanation of its meaning hopefully fulfills the thirst for that truth. The association of our members while at refreshment and the projection of that association into the community hopefully satisfies the desire for brotherly love and fraternity. But relief - how do we govern ourselves and establish our goals in today's society within this great nation?

First, I would like to put forth the hypothesis that there is indeed a great need for relief in our modern society. How do I define it? In my search for this answer, I consulted a book written by Joseph Fort Newton called "The Builders - a Story and Study of Freemasonry," published by the Macoy Publishing and Masonic Supply Company of New York. Although Brother Newton wrote his book in 1914, its message is as clear and direct today as it was then. He wrote the book to answer the questions he put forth when he joined the lodge at the turn of the century. It is a book that I commend to all Masons, but particularly to those whose path leads to the chair in their lodges. It is a book that I should have read ten years ago.

Consider "The Builder" to be divided in three sections. The first deals with the philosophy of the background of Freemasonry, heavy stuff maybe for the average reader, but nevertheless interesting. The second section deals with the history of Freemasonry, and the third section attempts to answer the question "What Is Freemasonry."

In my limited time today I simply wish to report that Freemasonry evolved from the guilds of stonemasons who knew how to cut their stones true, and knew how to cement them together with a wet mortar. They gathered at the site of the building they were to erect, and stayed there until their work was completed. Their typical day began with an assembly for prayer. They then went about their work. Their character and reputation was of the highest order. An unemployed brother was given work or sufficient means to tide him over to the location of the nearest lodge where work was available. Their widows and orphans were traditionally cared for. The nature of their work was esteemed to such a degree that they were deemed to serve the community at large.

When the emergence of architects superseded the planning of buildings by the Masters of the work, and the construction of what we regard as the old cathedrals came to an end, the work of the operative lodges gave way to the formation of speculative lodges and the creation of Accepted Masons. These lodges survived because of the continuation of the high moral standards of the operative Masons. In England, nobility and royalty became the accepted leaders of our fraternity. One of the Primary functions was relief of the needy, and that relief was not limited to the need of the brethren - relief was extended to the common good of the community.

Brethren, our Grand Master explains the meaning of a "cowan" as one who did not know the secret of how to mix a good wet cement. The tiler's duty was to see that the cowan did not discover that secret. Today we say that the trowel we used to spread the cement of brotherly love and affection among our brethren. If we love one another, don't we try to help each other and our fellow-man in time of need? Have we forgotten how to mix the cement.

During the time of the great depression and in the aftermath of the Second World War, social legislation throughout this great land created programs such as unemployment insurance, widows' allowances, hospitalization, medicare, Canada Pension, and even a national employment bureau called Manpower. The great principles of Freemasonry become carved in stone on our national fabric. Is there some responsible brother in your lodge who knows the workings of these social programs, their attributes and their shortcomings, and who can advise what course so that these programs can be used intelligently?

Today have our lodges stopped caring? Do we still possess the resources to help the needy? Are we seen to be fulfilling the demand for relief in the public eye? Reluctantly I fear that by and large our lodges in this jurisdiction may be falling short in meeting those obligations.

Today with our high unemployment, how many working brethren perceive themselves as having an obligation to help a worthy brother to find employment? How many unemployed brethren are there whose unemployment insurance benefits have run out? Would you be able to help him if he came to you and asked for assistance? Was he the brother you hadn't seen for a long time and suspended because he couldn't meet his financial responsibilities to the lodge?

How many lodges are concerned about their widows, know who they are, and in times of rampant inflation, know whether these widows have the means to look after themselves? We used to have the reputation for fixing the widow's roof if it leaked; or replacing a broken pane of glass. Do we now?

When was the last time a "hat" was passed in your lodge "for the assistance of a worthy brother in distress?" When did your lodge last receive a report that a worthy brother had been given assistance? (no names required).

On the positive side, I point out to you the example of the \$12 million senior citizens' complex recently opened in Newfoundland by Masons; the gift of a \$46 thousand van by the Masonic Foundation of Ontario and specially equipped for the Mississauga milk store clerk who was gunned down by three bandits and left paralyzed from the neck; the donation of three cars by the Freemasons of Manitoba to the Canadian Cancer Society, Manitoba Division, for the transportation of patients to and from treatment; the periodic visit that the past masters in the Calais area make to the Veterans' Hospital 150 miles away in Augusta in order that they may serve those patients for a day.

Brethren, I rest my case. I ask simply, is your public image gleaming - radiating the principles of brotherly relief and truth? Is there a reason for good men to petition your lodge for admission? Will they be proud to be Masons?

Does your lodge need to go back to work?
